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Sunday, the First Week of Advent

I came that they may have life and have it abundantly.

John 10:10

Lord Jesus, bless our Advent wreath as sign of your unending love and your presence among us. Amen.


Experience: As you light your Advent wreath each evening, read a verse, offer a prayer and conclude by singing or speaking an Advent hymn.
