- The **Lord's Prayer** is spoken in unison by the pastor and the congregation.
- The **Children's Sermon** is delivered by the pastor or other worship leader:
- P Hello, boys and girls, and welcome to Advent. Advent is a time when we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas. Long before Jesus was born, God promised his people that he would send a Savior from sin, death and the devil. Then when the time came close for Jesus to be born, he sent angels to tell special people that Jesus was that Savior.

He sent the angel Gabriel first to a man named Zechariah to tell him that he and his wife Elizabeth would have a son named John who would prepare the way for Jesus. Then he sent Gabriel to a young girl named Mary to tell her that she would be the mother of Jesus.

God's promises were coming true in Jesus. He showed the world that he had come from God by living a sinless life, healing the sick, performing miracles, and preaching and teaching the Good News that he had come to save the whole world. Jesus did that by dying on the cross and rising to life again to forgive our sins and open the way to heaven for us.

So how can you be like the angel Gabriel this Advent season? (Allow the children to respond.) That's right! We can be like Gabriel by announcing the coming of Jesus to people and telling them that God keeps his promises to us.

Sometimes we make promises to people or to ourselves, but then we don't always keep them, do we? That doesn't happen with God. When God makes a promise, he will always keep it. Think of these promises he has made to us:

Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be afraid, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and give you help, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand (Isaiah 41:10).

I have loved you with an everlasting love; therefore I have continued my faithfulness to you (Jeremiah 31:3).

Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool (Isaiah 1:18).

God promises in these verses that he will always be by our side and love us and forgive our sins. All these promises were fulfilled when Jesus came to earth. Jesus shows us that we can trust in God no matter what. We never need to be afraid.

So go out and spread the word that Jesus is with us and he loves us and forgives us. That is the greatest news anyone can hear, I promise. Let us pray:

Dear God, thank you for sending Jesus to us as you promised and for never forgetting us. Help us to be honest and true with one another and to keep our faith in you strong. Amen.

- The **Old Testament Reading**, Genesis 22:9-18, is spoken by the pastor or other worship leader:
- When they came to the place of which God had told him, Abraham built the altar there and laid the wood in order and bound Isaac his son and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to slaughter his son. But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him, for now I know that you fear God, seeing you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham lifted up his eyes and looked, and behold, behind him was a ram, caught in a thicket by his horns. And Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called the name of that place, "The Lord will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided." And the angel of the Lord called to Abraham a second time from heaven and said, "By myself I have sworn, declares the Lord, because you have done this and have not withheld your son, your only son, I will surely bless you, and I will surely multiply your offspring as the stars of heaven and as the sand that is on the seashore. - P Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who by God's power are being guarded through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. In this you rejoice, though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been grieved by various trials, so that the tested genuineness of your faith—more precious than gold that perishes though it is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the

revelation of Jesus Christ. Though you have not seen him, you love him. Though you do not now see him, you believe in him and rejoice with joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory, obtaining the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls. Concerning this salvation, the prophets who prophesied about the grace that was to be yours searched and inquired carefully, inquiring what person or time the Spirit of Christ in them was indicating when he predicted the sufferings of Christ and the subsequent glories. It was revealed to them that they were serving not themselves but you, in the things that have now been announced to you through those who preached the good news to you by the Holy Spirit sent from heaven, things into which angels long to look. Therefore, preparing your minds for action, and being sober-minded, set your hope fully on the grace that will be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ.

- The **Holy Gospel**, Matthew 13:36-43, is spoken by the pastor or other worship leader:
- P Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples came to him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world, and the good seed is the sons of the kingdom. The weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are gathered and burned with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all law-breakers, and throw them into the fiery furnace. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear."

- The **Dialog Sermon** is delivered responsively by the pastor and another reader, who is speaking the part of the angel:
- P During these Advent weeks, we are moving steadily toward Christmas, the celebration of the birth of Christ. The first time God's people moved toward Christmas, over two thousand years ago, their way was made easier, on a number of occasions, by the presence of angels, those messengers of God whom he had sent to announce the Good News of Christ's coming. We have heard about God's angels already in our Scripture readings, beginning with "the angel of the Lord" who called to Abraham there on the mountain of sacrifice—a dramatic demonstration of the promise in our Psalmody, that "He will give his angels charge of you to guard you in all your ways." When our Savior comes again, we know (and his coming again is one of the major themes of Advent), he will do so "in the presence of the angels," sent like reapers to gather the fruitful. In the meantime, as we move toward another celebration of Christmas, we do so quite aware of the role God's angels played in heralding that grand event and preparing his people for it. Would it be helpful for us, as we now move toward Christmas, if God's people could speak with those angels who once spoke to our ancestors in the faith? To hear their words afresh? Perhaps even to question them about their message as Zechariah and Mary once did? If we could hold conversations with the angels this Adventtide, what do you suppose they might say?
