Thursday After Ash Wednesday...... Genesis 3:6-8

YOU CAN'T HIDE

They heard the sound of the LORD God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God among the trees of the garden.

Genesis 3:8

God created the world, so everything was good. Then ... the first bad thing happened. Adam and Eve sinned. They felt ashamed and tried to hide from God. They knew God would find them, but they hid anyway.

Perhaps you remember a time when you did something wrong and you tried to hide what you had done from a parent, baby-sitter or teacher. How did that go? Did it make the problem go away? Did you really think

it would, or were you ashamed, avoiding what might happen because of your actions?

God called Adam and Eve out into the open and showed them their sin. He then told them what would happen because of it. They would have to leave God's perfect paradise. But that was not the end of Adam and Eve's story. God made a promise. God would send a Savior—God's first promise of amazing grace.

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Heavenly Father, thank you for walking with me, showing me my sin and for taking that sin away through Jesus.

THE LOVING FATHER

Luke 15:24

Jesus told a story about a young son who wanted to leave his father's home and go his own way. His loving father gave the son his inheritance and then let his son go live his life as he wanted.

When we make bad choices and stray from God's path, we are like that lost son. But there is good news for us. We can joyfully sing the line "I once was lost, but now am found" and

know that our Heavenly Father celebrates when we come back to him asking for forgiveness.

Saturday After Ash Wednesday...... Genesis 12:1-7

GOD MAKES PROMISES

And I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing.

Genesis 12:2

If you've ever broken a bone, you probably remember how much it hurt. You might also remember that you missed out on some activities for a little while. But the doctor promised it would heal, the pain would go away and you'd be running around soon.

Oh give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever!

Psalm 107:1

Jesus, you have opened my eyes to see how you are God. Help me point others to you too.




Tuesday, the First Week Luke 19:1-10
