




### **FAMILY GUIDE**

- Frosty says, "I'll be back again someday." Isn't it nice to know that Jesus will be back again someday to take us to heaven to live with him? See John 14:3.

### **Happy Birthday!**

In this Christmas classic, a young girl named Karen and her friends build a snowman and name him Frosty. A magician's hat is placed on Frosty's head. "Happy birthday!" Frosty says as he comes to life. The children realize that the rising temperature will make Frosty melt, so Karen and Frosty head to the cold North Pole on a refrigerated train. But Frosty sees that the train is too cold for Karen. So out of love,

Frosty carries her into a warm greenhouse to save her, knowing he might melt in the process.

He is willing to sacrifice himself so that Karen might live.

At Christmas we remember that Jesus came to sacrifice himself for us on the cross. He died that we might live. Jesus helps us to offer ourselves to others in loving response to his great love for us, a love that will not melt away but remain for us forever.

### **TUNING IN to CHRIST**

- Twelve-year-old George Bailey saves his younger brother Harry from drowning. Harry goes on to become a U.S. Navy pilot awarded the Medal of Honor. Christ, our brother, saved us from drowning in sin that we might one day receive the crown of life in heaven. See Titus 3:5.
- When George returns to his real life, he is overwhelmed with excitement to see the people and even the buildings he has grown to know and love.
   What excites us this Christmas when we see the people and places that have been touched by Christ's life? See Philippians 1:3.

 On Christmas Eve, when townsfolk are gladly giving money to help George get out of debt, Harry raises a toast to his brother, calling him, "The richest man in town." The implication is that he is rich in love and friendship, just as we are rich in love and friendship from Christ. See 2 Corinthians 8:9.

### If He'd Never Been Born

The turning point of *It's a Wonderful Life* comes when a down-on-his-luck George Bailey wishes he had never been born. The angel Clarence grants that wish, and George witnesses what life would have been like if he had not existed. At the moment George prays to God, asking to live again, George awakens from the dream. The whole experience makes George come to realize that his actions did, in fact, have a positive impact on the lives of others.

Christmas begs the question for us as Christians, "What if Christ had never been born?" In our mind's eye, we realize that without the birth of Jesus, our sins would not have been forgiven, we would not have heaven to look forward to and the world would be devoid of love and care and meaning. We thank God, therefore, for the wonderful life we have in Jesus, the babe of Bethlehem, who fills our days with blessing upon blessing.

The joy of this special is the excitement that comes through transformation. We are transformed as well by the lowly birth of our Savior Jesus, "wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger" (Luke 2:12). Our hearts are changed by the grace of God and the care of others who surround us with a little love, making us new creations in Christ, glorious to behold.



- The children enjoy catching snowflakes on their tongues. We are reminded that in Christ, "if your sins are like scarlet, [they will] become like snow" (Isaiah 1:18).
- When Linus recites Luke 2:8-14, it is the only time in the special that Linus drops his blanket. You could say he is holding on to Christ in that moment.
- When one ornament bends the little tree over, we remember that the Bible says "a bruised reed he will not break" (Isaiah 42:3). God in Christ makes our bent and bruised lives whole again.
