

In Life and Death

... and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts ...

ROMANS 5:5 (ESV)

Last Lent, our son Mark told us that his father-in-law Ray was near death. Ray lived his faith with his children, grandchildren and church family, always pointing to Jesus, his Savior, with quiet persistence. In his last hours, he expressed to family his hope of living with the Lord forever. My wife and I were deeply moved by the family's witness to Jesus at Ray's funeral.

Paul in Romans 5 described that Lenten hope in life and death: "God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (v. 8, ESV). "Justified by faith ... we rejoice in hope of the glory of God" (vv. 1-2, ESV). "We rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope" (vv. 3-4, ESV). "And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts ..." (v. 5, ESV). What hope we have!

In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed.

MARK 1:35

When I was in high school—a *very* long time ago!—I was not hopeless in math, but it was still hard for me. I'd struggle with my homework at night, and yes, it would be a true struggle. I could not make the concepts, much less the applications, make sense to me. So I would give up and go to sleep. Perhaps you might guess what happened the next day. I'd wake up, look at the unfinished problems, and I would, in a flash, *understand*.

Away from the immediacy of the struggle, the brain does the work it seems.

Lent might be a way of letting this happen in our spiritual lives. We can't leave completely, but we can follow Jesus into the desert in our own way by setting aside and sacrificing some of the distracting aspects of ordinary life. In their absence, who knows what the Spirit will make clear?
